# CONSCRIPT PROFITS To Pay for the War

## We must make Democracy safe in America.

While President Wilson was leading the line of conscripted poor men's lives down Pennsylvania avenue, the Senate was voting 4 to 1 against the conscription of rich men's dollars. Is this Democracy?

## SWAT THE CONSUMER.

The slogan of our lawmakers seems to be, "Swat the Consumber."
Incomes have been taxed only slightly. Approximately one billion dollars placed against this source of revenue. War profits taxed approximately the same amount. But the things we eat and wear, with a few amusements and luxuries thrown in, must pay approximately $\$ 19,000,000,000$. Nearly nineteen times as mach as war profits or incomes. Nineteen thousand millions of dollars in taxes placed upoa those least able to pay.

## IS THIS A WAR FOR PROVIT?

Swift and Company's net profit for 1917 was over $\$ 42,000,0000$. This was nearly $\$ 22,000,000$ greater than their profits for 1916. Do you wonder why the price of meat advanced? Is Swift a patriot or a trsitor?

There have been 7 sees new millionaires added to Democracy's roll of honor in the United States since the world war began.

War profits of a small group of big trusts amounted to $\$ 4,000$.000,000 in 1916. Last year, this year, and every year the landiords of America collect approximately $\$ 6,000,000,000$ for permitting us to live on God's earth. One year's legilazied robbery: ten thousand millions of dollars! These are only partial enumerations of profiterting instances.

The poor man's life has been taxed 100 per cent. That is, he has been conscripted for the period of the war, and, in many cases, for eternity. Why not make the rich man give everything above $85, \mathrm{kno}$ a year during the war in order to help conquer the Kaiser?

## IS THEIR PATRIOTISM GENUINE?

Newspapers were largely instrumental in precipitating America's entrance into the conflict. If they are sincerely patriotic, they wall gladly turn their profits over to Uncle Sam.

The extowns of newspapers are filles with exultations of patriot ism. All that is required to make these proclamations dynamic is a unifind demast by the great mase of Americans that the profits of al businessen above $\$ 5,000$ per year be taund 100 per cent to prosecute the war and to liquidate all war indebceacoes. ## NECESSITY DEMINTN IT

Rizht or wrong, we are at war Sewspapers have been suppressed, eitisens jailed for asserting tbeir constitutional rights of free sperch, peareful assemblagen dispersed by the authorities, all in the name of "war necessity" Granted that these onslaughte against Demorratic institations were necessary in order to insure saccess for America, how much more necessary to sobscript the wealth of the inordinately opelent that an ample supply of provisions for the army ant havy may te procured:

If the exizencies of war demand that ordinary privileges of the people be denied, should not the rich be denied the use of surplus cold? Espectally that surphas accruing as a sequence of war

## JUSTICE

Already the poor are groaning under the war burden. Those in charge of finascing the war are constantly devising new schemes and re-working oid schemes to get more money from the masses. The thoussnds of millionaires in this nation should first be stripped of their surplus, then, If necessary, tax the poor. But, until surplus wealth is drafted into the service of America, it is surely undemocratic during these hard times, to further impoverish the workingman and his family.
